# Don Nottoli



Donald F. Nottoli was one of the many distinguished teachers and coaches in the long history of Galt High School. Born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1927, Nottoli graduated from the College of the Pacific (University of the Pacific) in 1950 where he also played on the basketball team. He was hired by Galt High School Principal and District Superintendent Wendell Forney for the 1951-1952 school year, where he taught history and social studies and coached the junior varsity (B) basketball team. Nottoli began coaching the

varsity basketball team the following year, where he stayed for the next 39 years and over 900 games. Later he would coach the golf team after its establishment. Nottoli retired in 1991, and the high school gym was renamed the "Nottoli Dome" in 2002. Don Nottoli also served 40 years on the Galt Elementary School Board (1965-2005). His oldest son Don was a Sacramento County Supervisor. His other children, Andrea, Nick, and stepchildren Greg and Tami, live in the area.

## President

I hope you are all enjoying your summer. It is difficult to believe that just less than 8 months ago, we were experiencing strong winds, rain, flooding, and toppled trees. Let's hope we have an early Fall and ease into winter.

I know later in this newsletter, more will be written about our fireworks booth fundraiser. However, I want to personally thank everyone who volunteered their time to sell fireworks for us. We are not guaranteed that we will get to participate again next year. It depends on the city of Galt lottery process and whether noprofits ahead of us accept the opportunity to sell. Only four nonprofits are selected each year. I want to give a special thanks to Liz and Tom Haglund. I know on some days they worked 12 hour days when we were short staffed. Thanks to Chairman, Dan Tarnasky and to Gale Webber for all their help. Without everyone helping, we could not have done as well as we did. This is our largest fundraiser of the year. These funds help us with General Fund expenses throughout the year.

On a historical note, August is a very important month to our town. The first freight train to come to Galt was August 12, 1869. Galt was also established as a town this same year; and most activity began in August and after with the building of a new town and later, moving some of the buildings from the Liberty Township into Galt. We will be celebrating Galt's 154th year as a town. To think what our town looked like in 1869 to what it looks like today, is almost unbelievable. If Obed Harvey or John McFarland came back today, they would not recognize the little town they helped establish, though they could still find some familiar sights, buildings and homes. In 154 years there have been many families raised here. Some descendants of those families still live here. Farming and retail were the major occupations in

1869. Both are still important to our community today. However, the type of retail has changed. Once there may have been a general store that sold everything. Now there are various types of retail that specialize in certain categories of goods. Restaurants as we see today were nonexistent. While there may have been some crime, we experience much more today. Our sleepy little town has grown up. We hope that we still have the old town values and warm feelings for our neighbors, but we are not "Mayberry" anymore. Wouldn't it be great to go back for just a day to 1869 and see what life was like in Galt? Of course, we would miss all the amenities we are used to. Galt still has the small town feel. Perhaps because many people who live here have grown up here as have many of their family members. Perhaps people moved here to bring up their family in a small town setting. Whatever the reason, Galt is still the Great American Little Town (GALT). I like to think that the Galt Area Historical Society plays a big part in keeping our small town values through our preservation of Galt's history. It has allowed children and adults to get a glimpse of what Galt was like in yesteryear.

# Trip Through the Cemetery

Last month's gravestone inscription was "O W Wiles."

Oscar Watson Wiles was born in Missouri in 1871 but was raised in Des Moines, Iowa where his father, David, worked in a patent office. As a young man, Wiles made his way west, first stopping in Trinidad, Colorado, where he married May Butler in 1902. The following year, Oscar



and May moved to Oakland, California, where he became a California State Board of Trade member, a precursor to the California Chamber of Commerce. As a member of the Board, Oscar made a trip to Galt in 1908 and helped establish the first Galt Chamber of Commerce. In 1910, the Wiles family moved to Galt, where Oscar became a real estate agent. He was involved in the Knights of Pythias, the Congregational Church, the Chamber of Commerce and helped establish the Galt Improvement Club.

Oscar Wiles's life was cut short on a cold January afternoon in 1906. On a trip back from Lodi, the automobile he was riding in swerved to miss a horse-drawn wagon near Woodbridge and overturned, pinning underneath. He died the next day.

# Galt Firsts Part 2

We are continuing with Galt firsts from the last newsletter. Some things were surprises; some things were not.

#### First Mayor

You would think a town would have a mayor, unofficial or otherwise, within the first few years. Shouldn't there be a "spokesperson" to act in the name of the city? Arthur Thornton was the mayor of New Hope (Thornton) in 1891. J. Samuel Phillips was Lodi's mayor in 1892. Galt's first mayor didn't appear until 1946. Fred Wing, the publisher of the Galt Herald, was elected mayor by the other city councilmen. Wing also served on the Galt High School Board of Trustees.

#### First Fire Chief

The citizens of Galt founded the first official fire department in 1921 and named Fred Rothenbush its first chief. He served in the Stockton Fire Department for 15 years, six as the foreman of an engine company. While serving as fire chief, Rothenbush ran the Midway Café on the Lincoln Highway. Fred Rothenbush served as fire chief for two years before moving to Stockton and opening the Golden West Soft Drink Parlor.


#### First Police Chief

For its first 77 years, Galt's law enforcement came from a series of constables. The man who had just been elected constable when the City of Galt was incorporated in 1946 became its first police chief. Athos Loll, a local farmer, was appointed police chief by the new city council. He served for only 17 months before resigning. Edgar McCarthy replaced him.

#### First Newspaper

Usually, a newspaper comes with a population boom of 500 to 1,000 people. Gold Rush towns sprang up quickly, but the population came slowly with farming towns like Galt. Having been founded in 1869, Galt's population didn't get to 500 people until 1880. Galt's first newspaper began publication in June of 1881. John Joseph Campbell and William Henry Meacham founded the Weekly Galt Gazette in a twostory commercial building on C Street. Their publication contained mostly stories and essays from other publications. The local news was reserved to a single column on page three. For the next twenty-five years,

the Gazette was the sole news source for the Town of Galt.

#### First Automobile

It would be interesting to find out who owned the first automobile in Galt. The Nicolaus Brothers of Sacramento visited Galt in August of 1900, creating a stir with their "horseless carriage." It was such a novelty that it was written about in the Galt Gazette. Eight months later, Fred Harvey drove his new automobile around Galt and became the first Galt citizen to own one of the latest inventions.

#### First Gas Station

In the early days of the automobile in Galt, gasoline was sold like kerosine had been out of an above-ground tank for years. The merchants who sold it had a main business like a general store. Later, the garages that repaired autos also sold gasoline, like the Galt Garage in 1913. The first gas station with a "modern" gasoline pump was built in 1923 by Harvey Hiles on the Lincoln Highway south of Galt on the "death curve." The new building had a garage and residence. We know it today as the Curve Service Station.



Charles Liss and officially changed the name to Galt Supermarket around 1964.





# Society Finishes Successful Fireworks Sales Fundraiser

July 4th marked the final day of the seven day 2023 fireworks sales season. Each year the city of Galt holds a selection process for four (4) properly registered nonprofits to be able to sell safe and sane fireworks as a fundraiser. Each nonprofit works with TNT Fireworks to prepare for and sell fireworks for seven days between June 28 and July 4. TNT and the respective nonprofit share in the proceeds. For the Society this is an important fundraiser and is the primary fundraising effort for the General Fund. The General Fund supports expenses for the Rae House Museum, including the Liberty Schoolhouse restoration, as well as the conservation of historical artifacts and documents related to the communities of Arno, Clay, Colony, Elliott, Galt, Herald, Hicksville, Liberty and Thornton.

Historian Dan Tarnasky served as the 2023 Fireworks Fundraiser Chair and Board Secretary Liz Haglund headed up the volunteer signups for daily shifts. While it is not glamorous work the volunteers staffing the booth greet customers, sell fireworks and are certainly the point where the rubber meets the road for a successful fundraiser. This year the weather was particularly hot, but those volunteering found the strength to endure and push aside inhibitions to greet customers coming to the Fairway Drive parking lot where all four nonprofits vied for sales. The nonprofit that is most successful attracting the customer typically does better in making sales. This year the Society was particularly successful achieving net sales of approximately \$15,102.11. Fireworks is the single largest fundraiser for the General Fund this year and will help the Society in its effort to meet 2023 General Fund expenses of \$34,479.
