It was our opportunity to show those in attendance what we do and have to offer. This is dedication. Why does Ron Jacobson and Earl Frey and the gang at the McFarland Living History Ranch do what they do? Why does Earl Arrants spend his time making sure the rose garden at the Rae Museum has all the many memorial roses documented? Why do our docents spend their time giving tours of the McFarland Home and the Rae House Museum? Why does the McFarland Ranch seem like Ida Denier's second home? Why does Dan Tarnasky work so diligently archiving our history? Why do we as Galt Area Historical Society members do what we do on a daily basis? I think it is not only our dedication, but our love for our town and the surrounding area. It is our desire that we

preserve our history for future generations who will come after us.

Each of us has our own reasons for volunteering. It certainly is not because we have nothing else to do! March Meeting Report!

The meeting started with Galt High student, Steven Sharp, previewing the new GAHS website he has been working on with two of the Society members. It should be up and running before the end of April! Dan Tarnasky, our Historian, reported that he received two pictures of the Orr Ranch and Orr House. He continues to reach out to our community to access historical photos and documents he can scan, archive and share on

Facebook, in weekly articles in the Galt Herald, and at the Rae House Museum. Our Board has been busy getting bids for a new roof for the Rae House, a new coat of paint for the McFarland House, and gravel for the roads at the McFarland Living History Ranch. Three bids will be requested for the roofing and painting which also includes power washing and some repairs that need to be made due to dry rot and woodpecker damage. It was reported that a few items need to be done to the new bathrooms at the McFarland Living History Ranch including installing rails, posting ADA signage, and obtaining final inspections by the County before the bathrooms are considered "completed". They should be ready for the "Sip N Snack" event this summer. Upcoming fundraisers were discussed including "Kite Day" at the MLHR on April 8th, "An Evening in Italy" dinner on May 5th, and a "Tea at the Rae" planned for May 26th. It was discussed that many of our fundraisers will be designated to pay for Roofing the Rae and Painting the Mac. The Board is also applying for a Community Grant to assist with the funding needed to put a new roof on the Rae House. Finally, our President reported that the Society is doing some preliminary planning on how it can participate in the 2019 Lincoln Highway convoy that will pass through our area as they relive the 1919 Eisenhower trip. More details to come as they become available.

An Evening in Italy!

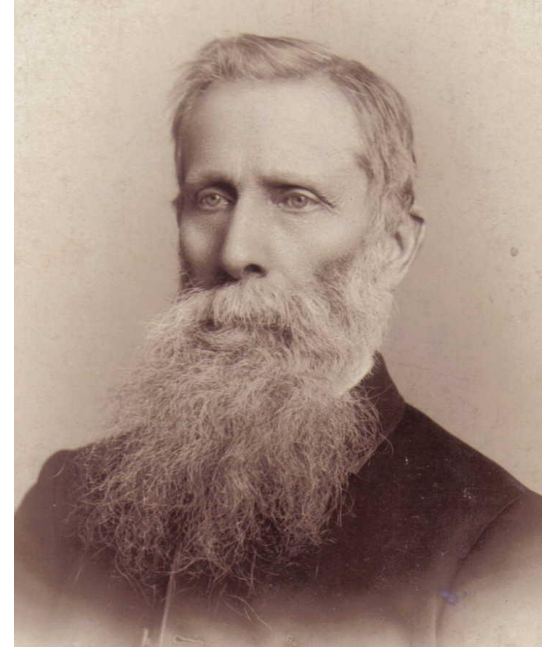

John Brewster was one of the original commercial businesses in town. His building, the Brewster Building, is still in existence on the corner of 4th and B Streets. No one is 100% sure who built and owned the building. Some people say it was John McFarland because of the thousands of bricks he had stored at his house, and he built some other Galt structures. Others say it was John Brewster himself with the help of Sacramento architect William W. Hamilton. Some of the evidence suggests that it was Brewster because the building said J. Brewster and Co. at the top of the building instead of J. McFarland. One of the causes of John Brewster's bankruptcy could be that he spent too much on the building. When he filed for bankruptcy, he lost the building. If it belonged to John McFarland, it would still have been his. Older writings say John McFarland built a wooden structure on the same site previously and Whitaker and Ray ran their first business out of it. The confusion could have started there. We will never know for sure.
