# August Pahl

A Galt personality from the past set up shop on the corner of 5th and C Streets. August Pahl wore many hats. He was Assistant Fire Chief in the Galt Fire Department, drove a school bus for the Galt Elementary School District, Director of the Galt Sanitary District, and City Council member. Born in Forbes North Dakota in 1905, Pahl learned the cobbler trade from his father who had a shoe/harness shop in Forbes. Coming to California in 1925 for the weather, he first settled in Elk Grove and worked on local ranches. It was there that Pahl met Erna Forsch and the two married in 1930. The Great Depression made finding ranch work difficult, and the Pahls decided to move to Galt in 1936 and open a shoe shop. It was here that August Pahl made a name for himself by getting involved in his community. After 30 plus years as the local cobbler, Pahl retired to enjoy time with his family and friends.

## Policy and Procedure Review

# Membership Committee

#### I. Purpose:

The GAHS Membership Committee assists in ensuring a viable body of members is sustained who support the Mission of the GAHS. It does this by assisting in recruiting and renewing new and existing members; maintaining an accurate list of pertinent information regarding each member; and engaging members in the shared mission of "Preserving the Irreplaceable" by keeping members informed regarding volunteering opportunities and membership events.

#### II. Related Documentation:

· Membership Applications; Excel Membership Master List; Membership Packet

#### III. Procedure:

- 1. Membership dues are due during the month of January of the following year, unless a member has paid close to the end of the calendar year (on or after October 1). If that is the case, renewal is due a year later. It is not the policy of the GAHS to prorate dues.
- 2. Dues are as follows:
  - a. Individual (I) \$20 yearly
  - b. Family (F) \$40 yearly
  - c. Student (S) \$10 yearly
  - d. Individual Lifetime (IF) \$200 one time
  - e. Family Lifetime (FL) \$250 one time
  - f. Small Business (SB) \$50 yearly
  - q. Honorary Life (HL) free (must be approved by GAHS Board see Bylaws Article 3, Section 6)
- 3. Most new membership applications are mailed to the Society address and then forwarded to the Membership Chairperson. Others may come through the website and PayPal. These should also be forwarded to the Membership Chairperson. Address changes or any other pertinent information regarding members should be forwarded to the "Tower Views" newsletter editor in order to keep an up-to-date mailing list.
- 4. Membership Chairperson shall forward dues (checks, cash, PayPal documentation) to the Treasurer with a list detailing the name of the member, check number, amount, and type of membership. Membership Chairperson will provide the member a receipt upon request.
- 5. Membership Chairperson shall update the Excel Membership Master List from the applications. The updated Membership Master List should be printed and given to the President on a quarterly basis.
- 6. Membership Chairperson shall ensure that new members are mailed/emailed a Membership Packet which can include: Membership Card, "Thank You" letter, "Welcome" letter, Release of Liability form, and a Member Interest Survey.
- 7. Completed applications and Release of Liability forms should be properly stored and available to the GAHS Board. Lifetime and Honorary Life applications should be kept permanently. All other "yearly" membership applications should be kept for three years and then can be shred.

# **Old John**

Over the 150 years of Galt's history, there have been those people that are remembered for their contributions to the community, infamous deeds, the content of their character, or for an odd quirk in their personality. One of those people in the latter category was a man named John McHolden or, as most called him at the time, "Old John." He stood out in the Galt community for obvious reasons, and one reason that wasn't so obvious.

Not much was known about Old John's past at the time. No one knew his birthdate, but they did know he came from Vermont. He served in one of the volunteer infantry regiments from that state during the Civil War and came to California, and Galt, in particular, in the early 1870s. John became one of the first members of the Franklin Post of the Grand Army of the Republic (a Union Army fraternity organization) that began in Galt in 1889. What people knew most about John came from the fact that he staffed the front desk at the Harvey Hotel (Harvey House).

McHolden had above-average John intelligence, was honorable, and his word was unquestioned. When passengers got off the train and walked east on C Street to the Harvey Hotel, Old John was the one who would offer them a room and quide them to different places around town according to their needs. For the better part of twenty years, Old John was a familiar, friendly face, not only at the Harvey but around town as well. Why did people call him "Old John?" Maybe because the life expectancy at the time was forty and he surpassed that number by one third. John McHolden was a model citizen and a friend to just about everyone who knew him. So, what one little quirk set him apart from everyone else?

If one walked into the Harvey Hotel on John's off hours, you would find him sleeping in a chair. Sure, a lot of people do it, but for eight hours every night? He would sit in his chair, tilt it back against the wall with the front legs off the floor and fall asleep in the sitting position. The only time he laid in a bed was when he became


extremely ill. It was assumed the chair had arms for some semblance of comfort. No one could persuade him to sleep in the best beds of the day. He was most comfortable and rested in his chair. In his later years, Old John became more and more hunchbacked for obvious reasons.


"Old John" McHolden passed away in 1891 and was "laid" to rest in the Liberty Cemetery by the members of the GAR post in Galt. The Harvey Hotel has been gone for decades, not surviving the many fires in downtown Galt. The story of "Old John" still exists in the pages of the Galt Gazette.


