### From the Archives Galt Grammar School

Galt Grammar School was the first school in Galt and was built in 1879 with money donated by Central Pacific Railroad tycoon Charles Crocker and Galt founder Dr. Obed Harvey. It was located on the southeast corner of 5th and B Streets. Grades one through four were on the first floor and grades five through eight were on the second floor. A bigger Galt Grammar School was built on E Street and the old Galt Grammar School was torn down in 1915 to make way for three homes. When the new school opened, there was a procession of students walking from the old to the new school. Looking at the photograph, adults were less concerned about child safety than they are today.

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

Now in existence for over 34 years, the Galt Area Historical Society continues to strive to "Preserve the Irreplaceable". We write to you today to ask for your support of our organization this year with a donation to our annual fundraising campaign.

The Galt Area Historical Society has accomplished a lot in the past 34 years including:

- Restored the Rae House on Oak Street and created a museum filled with artifacts from the area
- Restored the Liberty and Elliott pioneer cemeteries
- Identified and dedicated 22 local historical landmarks
- Created a video on the history of the Galt area (available on DVD)
- Leased the McFarland Living History Ranch (MLHR) and 35 acres of farmland
- Restored the McFarland House and six buildings on the grounds
- In cooperation with the Galt Elementary School District, developed an education visitation program at the McFarland Living History Ranch to complement the School District's California History curriculum (3,000 to 5,000 children from Central Valley schools visit the ranch every year)
- Archived over 10,000 historical photographs
- Compiled 100 family history files
- Recorded 25 oral family histories

The most significant event last year was the donation of the Liberty School House by the Henke Family Trust to the Galt Area Historical Society. The schoolhouse was moved to the Rae Museum grounds and we are anxious to begin the process to restore and furnish the structure back to an original oneroom schoolhouse.

Plans are also in works to makeover the Rae House Museum to designate each room with a theme and include more historical photographs and information on Galt's history.

The Historical Society relies upon the generous financial support of private individuals to help us preserve and care for Galt's historical legacy. ## The Fire of 1932


Galt, like most towns and cities across America, has endured its share of devastating fires in its early history. In 1932, a fire burned the same block for the third time in fifty years.

On Sunday, August 14, 1932, a fire broke out in the Spanish Ballroom that spread through the brick block on the northeast corner of 4th and C Streets. Carrie Alderman, the wife of the owner, heard a crackling noise and alerted the fire department. Before firefighters could bring the fire under control, it had spread through the Galt Hotel, Wallace Sawyer's apartments, Evan's Mercantile, Louis Alderman's Department Store, and Leo Ludwig's Barbershop. Doc Osler's Drugstore on 4th Street received water, and smoke damage and the awning over Alderman's Miniature Golf Course was a total loss.

The delay in response time was because Galt used volunteers in its fire department. Firefighters had to come from neighborhoods throughout the town and get the equipment from Angus Quenell's Garage. A call went out to get help from Elk Grove, Thornton, and Lodi. Other volunteers helped remove stock from the bottom floors of stores and the hotel. There was a rumor that the fire started from a lit cigarette left in the Ballroom after a dance but the Ballroom manager, James Sparks, said he checked everything and even turned the power off. He thought the cause was arson. There was a broken window in one of the restrooms close to where the fire started. When firefighters first arrived, they said they saw black smoke like that from oil or qas.

The owner of the brick corner block, Louis Alderman, vowed to rebuild immediately after the clean-up. In April of 1933, a new \$22,000 Spanish Ballroom had reopened. Val Valente's thirteen-piece orchestra played for a crowd on the Ballrooms 10,000 ft dance floor (30 extra feet were added). All the bottom floor shops had been repaired but Sawyer's upstairs apartments were never replaced.

A June 9, 1933 edition of the Sacramento Bee had an article with Alderman's proposal for a new \$35,000 three-story hotel with thirtyeight air-cooled and steam-heated rooms. The bottom floor would have a fully decorated lobby and six new stores. It never happened. Louis Alderman passed away two weeks later from a heart attack while visiting San Francisco.

# The Rae House is Getting a Makeover

The Galt Area Historical Society was founded in 1987 with the goal of "Preserving the Irreplaceable." In that same year, we acquired the Rae House with the intention of restoring her to the former Victorian glory of the 186Os. The City Council offered the developers a waiver of park fees if they would give the City the Rae House and 3/4 of an acre of land surrounding it. The developers agreed, and the City Council then deeded the house and land to the Galt Area Historical Society with the stipulation that the Rae family house be restored, and a museum created and maintained. Since that time, members and other kind donors have filled the house with artifacts and kept it open for all to see. After 30 years, it's time for a makeover.

Why are we doing this? While walking through the "museum," you'll notice that there is no method of teaching local history. Local school kids would walk out, not knowing anymore Galt area history than when they walked in. There are several artifacts and photos that are unlabeled. Half of the artifacts have nothing to do with local history, but they were kindly donated to help fill a space. It's an eclectic mix of different items where someone couldn't decide whether it's a furnished Victorian home or a museum. It has always been called the Rae House Museum and now the time has come to turn the Rae House into a first-class local "museum."

Over the next 6 to 8 months, we will be slowly transforming each room with new displays and artifacts that tell the history of Galt, Herald, Thornton, Liberty, Clay Station, Elliott, Arno, Colony, and Hicksville. Some items will be placed in a new display while others are permanently removed. If you have donated any items on display, please contact us regarding their historic significance. If they meet the new standards, we will put them on display. If they will not be kept and you would like the items back, we will arrange for pick up. Otherwise, we will sell unused artifacts for funds to create more displays and purchase more Galt area historical artifacts. At the same time, if you have something relating to Galt area history and would like us to display it, bring it to the Rae House or arrange for pick up.

We know there are those people that don't like to see change, but the Rae House displays, in their present state, have become outdated and without a method of teaching history. We hope everyone understands our goal.



When I was about 6 years old a medicine show came to Galt and pitched a tent on the corner of 6th and B Street. There were many empty lots around then. My Dad, Mom, Grandma, and Carl, my brother went to see it. The tent wasn't so large, I realize now, but then it seemed spacious. Several lanterns hung on the sides. We sat on wooden benches.

The man began his spiel warning people of sickness and holding up bottles of "guaranteed to cure" medicine. I was intrigued with the "tape worm". Oh how dangerous that was!

If anyone accidentally swallowed one, it would live in their stomach and eat one's food up before the person could digest it, all the while growing larger.

Then the wonder liniment- a red colorused to ease lameness on man or horse. Oh yes, if you had "catarph" in your chest it would cure it. Those wonderful "medicines".

We smile of peoples ignorance of yesteryears. We are so much wiser today-Ha! Ha!

In 1952 "HADACOL" put in an appearance, the wonder medicine. Most of us laughed but enough took it seriously. We had a joke "HADACOL" they had to call it something. It soon disappeared.

A few years later another fellow sold medicine - he had a business on 4th street and shipped cases out of Galt. He made money until he was told by authorities he had to get out of California.

There was also that tonic just for ladies who thought the stork was waiting too long to pay a visit – Lydia Pinkham's "A Baby in Every Bottle". Another medicine I can't recall its name Little Liver Pills.

Sienna Tea - it really WORKED or I should perhaps say "it would really send you to the nearest bathroom.
