From the Archives Galt Fashion Shop

In the history of Galt, there have been few women's clothing stores. As a rule, clothing was carried in general merchandise stores and only a few styles were carried for men, women, and children. Most people went to Sacramento or Lodi to do their shopping in specialty shops. One of the few women's clothing stores to open in Galt was the Galt Fashion Shop owned and operated by Erma Listini (left). Assisted by her sister-in-law Lydia Listini (right), the Shop opened around 1956, carried high end women's clothes, and was known for its quality service. Erma Listini retired in 1967 and Gerry Melhaff opened Gerry's Fashion Shop. That store switched from women's clothing to one that catered to teens. Lydia Listini continued to work for Gerry Melhaff for about a year. (Thanks to Luana Listini Whitford for the information)

Policy and Procedure Review Handling Cash

I. Purpose:

Proper handling of cash at fundraising events will help protect the Society from theft, fraud or embezzlement; protect volunteers from accusations of dishonesty or the temptation to commit fraud; and, assure donors that their donation and gifts are used for the purpose for which they were given.

II. Related Documentation: Cash Count Worksheet; Deposit Slips

III. Procedure:

- 1. Utilize a log to document which volunteers were in charge of a cash box.
- 2. Keep a standard amount of start-up cash in each cash box.
- 3. Require the volunteer to sign the log indicating his/her agreement with the start-up amount when checking out the cash.
- 4. Do not allow co-mingling of personal money with donations.
- 5. Never utilize cash collections for last minute purchases the day of the event.
- 6. Refrain from making change unless a patron has made a purchase/donation.
- 7. Accept checks made out to the Society only. Immediately endorse the checks with a restrictive endorsement payable to the Society.
- 8. Always have at least two people present when counting cash. Each person should fill out a Cash Count Worksheet and all of the sheets should arrive at the same total. These sheets should each be signed by individuals counting the cash.
- 9. Always count money immediately after an event and deposit it in the bank or night deposit drop immediately. If security is an issue, have two people go to the bank together.
- 10. Utilize, if available, lockable bank bags to secure cash bag and collections.
- 11. If cash cannot be counted immediately, make arrangement with the Treasurer/ President in advance. Do not take money home if at all possible. Any money needed to be stored for counting the following day should be safeguarded in a safe or lock box.
- 12. If possible, separate the components of cash handling collecting, depositing, and reconciling so that one individual does not have responsibility for more than one component.



A Look Back at the 1918 Spanish Flu Pandemic

Most Historical Society members are reading this newsletter while shut-in at home in response to Governor Newsome's recommendation to "stay home and stay safe." Anyone who has studied American history is remembering another time when citizens had to do the same thing. The year was 1918 and, instead of COVID-19, it was the Spanish Flu. The similarities are uncanny. Did the authorities learn something the first time? Is history repeating itself?

No one had any idea what the Spanish Flu was in 1918. In the US, experts believe this flu strain started in Kansas at Camp Funston. World War I was in its 3rd year and America was prepping for its entrance in the spring. Camp Funston was one of 16 army training facilities established in response to upcoming American troop involvement in Europe. The first recorded case of the yet unnamed Flu was a cook who quickly spread the Flu to 522 other recruits. Once those men reached Europe, the Flu spread even more. Because of news blackouts on the war front, word about the flu strain in Europe was nonexistent. This new strain of Flu got its name from Spain, where they had no news blackout and reported stories of flu statistics.

Back home, the "Spanish flu" was spreading but

was no different than any other strain. Chills, fever, and fatigue were the norm. It was when American troops were coming home in the fall of 1918 that the "second wave" hit and became a more deadly strain. That version of the Flu produced a "bluing" of the skin and fluid in the lungs. Those who had the Flu in the first wave were immune to the second version.

Attempts to eradicate the Spanish Flu were like what's going on today. Schools, theatres, libraries, and churches closed. Galt schools closed in November, reopened for a short time, and then closed again in December when three teachers exhibited flu symptoms. Genevieve Harvey and the Red Cross in Galt sold surgical masks and shipped knitted garments to hospitals and quarantine stations. People were asked to stay indoors as much as possible.

Tylenol is the drug of choice for fighting COVID-19 today, but there were other "miracle" drugs back in 1918. Aspirin was prescribed and worked to a point until some doctors suggested doses of 30 grams, which they found out was toxic and was contributing to flu deaths. Tanlac was advertised and sold at Doc Osler's pharmacy as a "system purifier" to help void the body of the flu virus. It turns out that it contained 15% alcohol and didn't accomplish anything but give you a buzz. How hard did the Spanish Flu hit Galt? Cemetery records show burials in 1916 and 1917 to number about 6 or 7. Burials spiked to 15 in 1918. Most people survived like James Davis, a conductor on the Amador Rail Line. The Bank of Galt closed while its cashier Ralph Post stayed home to combat the illness. Some Galt citizens were unlucky. Reverend Charles Verleger of the Episcopal Church died in October. Frank Warren, the husband of Maude Quiggle Warren, passed away in November from complications of pneumonia caused by the Flu. Mary Boggiano, a senior at Galt High School, and Elsie Bachelder, a sixth-grader at Galt Grammar School, both died in December. It could have been much worse. There were a few cases reported in January, but in a newspaper article published February 8th said that the Spanish Flu had ended because there hadn't been any new cases reported in the "past week."

So here we sit, trying to "wait it out." The television is on more often, our waistlines are getting bigger, but we're quarantined against something that could get worse before it gets better. It seems like history is repeating itself, and if we didn't learn anything from the past, we should have.

There is a 5.2% transaction fee on all donations made through the system. The donation form does offer the ability for you to cover this fee. If you do opt to include the fee, your donation will increase by 5.2%. As an example, if your donation is \$100 and you choose to cover the fee when checking out, your donation will now total \$105.20. This year's Big Day of Giving is Thursday, May 7, 2020, but you can donate after April 20 for it to count in the total. For those of you who have donated already this year, thank you very much.
